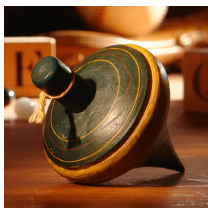
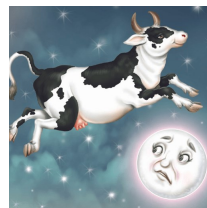


## ACORNS CLASS—SPRING ONE

In the Long Ago project your child will learn about their history and how they have changed from when they were babies. They will learn about their family history and heritage and find out what life was like when their grandparents were children. They will learn about what it was like to go to school in the past and how everyday objects, such as clothes, toys and vehicles have changed.

### Personal, social and emotional development

Play cooperatively with others and take turns, understanding that it is important to share resources and take turns in order to get on with others

### Maths

Exploring numbers to 10, comparing numbers within 10 and addition up to and including 10.

### Understanding the World

We will begin to recognise and discuss how we have changed from when we were babies understanding that people change as they grow and have changed since they were babies, both in their appearance and what they are able to do.

### Phonics and Drawing Club

**Phonics:** We will begin learning common exception words (I, me, the, go etc.) and reading Red Ditty books using our phonetical knowledge.

**Drawing Club:** We will be focusing on stories from 'Long Ago' including *Mr Benn*, *We're Going on a Bear Hunt*, *The Magic Porridge Pot* and others.

### Communication & Language

We will listen to others when 1:1 or in a small group, start or continue a conversation with a friend for many turns and listen attentively and respond to what we hear with relevant questions, comments and actions when being read to and during whole class discussions and small group interactions.

### Physical development

Dance: recognise actions can be performed to music. Copy, repeat and perform some basic actions to music.

Gymnastics 2: further develop confidence in fundamental movements, learning and refining a variety of shapes, jumps, slides and rolls.

### Religious Education
